Adani visits Palm Island to talk business and jobs

Palm Island residents were keen to talk about employment and business opportunities at the Carmichael Project when Adani's Regional Content and Indigenous team visit the community yesterday.

Adani Mining Indigenous Engagement Manager Paul Travers said Adani was ready to start mining and delivering on its commitments to employ and create opportunities for Traditional Owners.

"We've been working with Traditional Owners and Indigenous communities local to the Carmichael Project since 2010. As a result we have approved Indigenous Land Use Agreements and Cultural Heritage Management Plans in place with all groups in the project footprint.

"Our employment and training commitments will create multi-generational benefits for our Indigenous communities."

Expressions of Interest for roles on the Carmichael Project as well as work packages are now being released.

"We're keen to get as many people from our Indigenous communities involved and benefitting from the project as possible. Now is the time to register on our website, or talk to our teams about how to participate," Mr. Travers said.

"We announced last week that a Wangan and Jagalingou certified business, Woongal, has been contracted to provide environmental monitoring and survey services across the mining lease and in the Doongmabulla Springs area.

"We're looking forward to appointing more Indigenous contracts to the project."
